

Episode SixThe Redemption of Jonah

Matthew 12:38-42

Summary of Jonah's Bungles

Runs away from God's command to go to Nineveh
Misleads the sailors as to the character of Yahweh
Expresses relief rather than repentance front the belly of the whale
Preaches the shortest and most unhelpful sermon to Nineveh
Disappointed by Nineveh's repentance and resents God's mercy
Exhibits a self-serving kind of love as contrasted with God's self-costing love

The Sign of Jonah, the Redemption of Jonah's Story

The intensity of Pharisee opposition rising up to a pitch (Matt 12:14)
The Pharisees ask Jesus for a sign (not a sincere request but a test)
The Sign of Jonah: three days for three days (Matt 12:38-42)
God was working a future good right in the middle of Jonah's mess
Jesus links Jonah's story with His death and resurrection
He uses the failed prophet as His marketing image!
This redeems bungling Jonah undeservedly to a place of honor in God's economy

God's Specialty as Redeemer

A strong God could prohibit all evil

A stronger God allows the free agency of evil and bends it toward His good purposes The grenade that rolls back downhill: Psalm 7:14-16

This is what happened at the cross! 1 Corinthians 2:8

Reminding us that our failures and sins do not have the last word on our destinies Reminding us that all things work together for good: Romans 8:28 God can redeem anything and anyone and loves to be invited into redemption work

Step One	Name a specific area in your life that you need redemption and know that God sees it!
Step Two	Lament the reality of brokenness
Step Three	Name the reality of Jesus the Redeemer
Step Four	Communion
Step Five	Giving thanks for the redemption that Jesus is working in our lives
